A Message from Deacon Paul

There is one member of our family who, to protect her anonymity, I will call Aunt Beatrice. My Aunt Beatrice was a widow, who went to Mass every Sunday and belonged to a small group that made rosaries for the missions and embroidered baptismal gowns for the parish. She watched Mass on EWTN every day and joined along with the rosary every time it came on. And yet, despite all her good works and devotions, she adamantly refused to talk to her daughter-in-law. The details aren't important. What is important is that she had a history of this behavior. Aunt Beatrice always seemed to be feuding with someone. She had to always control everything and everybody in her life, and she had to make sure that everyone knew she was in control.

On December 8, we will celebrate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception and hear the gospel story of the Annunciation and Mary's perfect 'Yes.' One of the things I really like is that Luke doesn't portray Mary as some sort of Pollyanna, where Mary immediately responds, "May it be done to me according to your word." She has a few questions. It's a lot for a teenager to deal with all at once. But, after taking the time to reflect on God's will, she finally says, "May it be done to me according to your word." She totally surrenders to God's will and lets God take control of her life.

So, on one hand you have my Aunt Beatrice, who says, "Thy will be done, but only in select areas of my life." On the other hand, you have Mary, who says, "May it be done to me according to YOUR word." It is total control versus total surrender. Each of us is somewhere on the continuum between holding on to total control of our life and giving God total control of our life.

Advent is a great time to think about where we are on the continuum of control and identify those areas of our life where we still want to do it our way and not God's way. It could be a difficult relationship. It could be an addiction to something, such as power, control, wealth, recreation, sex, substance abuse, etc. God already knows where each of us is on the continuum. We just need to be brutally honest with ourselves and own up to it.

Let's choose an area to work on. Then, when we come to church on Christmas to celebrate the birth of our Lord, let's offer that area as a birthday gift to the Christ child and turn control of that area over to God. Let's also thank the Blessed Mother for showing us how to hand over control of our lives to God and ask her to give us the courage to say and mean the words that she said and that her son would paraphrase some 34 years later when he said, "Not my will, but your will be done."

Numbers, Patriotism, and Service

How in the world are the themes "Numbers, Patriotism, and Service" related, you may ask? It's really quite simple. Allow me to explain.

Our world has become number oriented. In many ways, we are just a number ourselves and everything we have is related to a number -- Social Security number; phone number; account numbers; serial numbers; etc. Even most passwords require a number.

What do you think of when you hear the word "numbers"? The Book of Numbers? Numbers racket? Calendar day or month? The old Knighthood Degrees (1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th)? The degree of injury from a burn? If I say "4th", do you think of the 4th of July? How about "5th"? Perhaps the 5th amendment or a 5th of alcohol. What about 7-11? The convenience store by that name or lucky numbers for a dice roll?

Then there is the number 911. No doubt everyone knows that is the number to dial when there is an emergency. But if you add a slash, that number becomes 9/11. For all of us, that number now brings back vivid memories of the World Trade Center terrorist attack. 2001 – the year that it occurred. If it wasn't for just marking the 20th anniversary, many folks are hard pressed to remember the year. 2753 people were killed at the Trade Center that day. Over 3000 when combined with the deaths at the Pentagon and Shanksville, Pa.

After 9/11/2001, what did you see? The stars and stripes were flying from homes and businesses all over the country ... even overseas. You could not buy a flag since stores were sold out. Folks returned to churches to pray for our country. Patriotism was at a level not seen in decades. Everyone said that it was a date that they would never forget. Fast forward 15 or 20 years. Did that wave of patriotism last? No, it's faded away -- except for perhaps once a year when it briefly makes the headlines on the anniversary of 9/11. Our patriotism for the country has been replaced with political and social rivalries.

So what can all of us do?



The hats also provided a link to the camaraderie that they share with others who also wear those hats. Some of those hats listed two and sometimes three wars in which they served. Even when I understood that, I was embarrassed to say anything to them ... to thank them for their commitment to our country.

The next time you are out and around and see one of those gents or ladies wearing a service hat, be sure to stop and thank them for their service to our country. The same goes when you see someone in uniform. Our armed services are made up of volunteers. Anyone serving in the military doesn't have to be there ... they chose that career. Make sure you thank them for making the choice to keep us safe and free.

As Catholic Gentlemen in service to others as Knights, there is always a need to be met somewhere in our home, parish, and neighborhood. There are many in need. And there are many who should be thanked for their service and their patriotism. Be sure to show your patriotism in the actions you take and the words you say.
